SCHOLARSHIP

I investigate the communication practices used to negotiate interactions in a variety of health and mental health contexts. Much of my work examines the situated communication practices of individuals diagnosed with neurological and psychiatric disorders to provide a grounded perspective on competence including everyday functioning, community participation and patient engagement. I examine clinical work practices and clinical reasoning to consider applications of patient-centeredness, shared decision-making and the use of decision support strategies and health information technology in clinic communication. I also explore the process, perceptions and ethics of community-engagement and community-based participatory research in public health and clinical settings. My work informs our understanding of best practices, intervention development and implementation and contains a strong applied component, particularly to inquiry in health services.
