A new collaborative led by IFH has received a \$3.6 million, three-year grant from the National Institutes of Health to increase participation of New Jersey minority older adults in research.




"I am thrilled, and very honored, for me, and for Rutgers," Pottick said.

MARSH, RONNER PUBLISH THIRD BOOK

"The 'infertility sisters' have done it again!" begins the acclaim for the newest book by Dr. Margaret Marsh, PhD, and her sister, Dr. Wanda Ronner, MD. The Pursuit of Parenthood: Reproductive Technology from Test-Tube Babies to Uterus Transplants," was published by Johns Hopkins University Press in August.



Marsh's fourth individually, and focuses on the recent history of infertility, reproductive medicine, and reproductive technology, with real experiences and insights from experts and individuals. Their research was funded by an Investigator Award in Health Policy Research from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation.
